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

The textbook itself appeals to students who learn well through reading, and the images add interest and reinforcement. The ancillary videos benefit students who learn best through multimedia resources, and the forthcoming practice quizzes should help these students even more. The content is clearly organized into standalone modules, and the organization within each module (think "chapter") is designated on the first page. Making the chapter outline clickable would increase functionality and interactivity, but it's not vital.

While the multimedia elements are not embedded in the textbook, they are available on the Public Speaking Project's website. The layout uses a newsletter design, which looks a bit crowded at times but nicely breaks up the text into manageable chunks. Quotes, images, and text boxes also reinforce content and break up chunks of large text.
